

The kindergarten and preschool classes enjoyed their year-end field trip on May 21<sup>st</sup>. They traveled to Fort Dodge and had such a memorable day. The kindergarten class was dropped off at the Fort Museum where they saw so many historical items. Their imaginations went wild as they peered out the fort lookout as the soldiers did years before. They toured the old town with wooden sidewalks leading to a variety of buildings and shops. When visiting the pharmacy, the pharmacist spoke with the children about who to take medicine from and how important it is. When visiting the bakery, the children were shown how to make a rose out of frosting and enjoyed cookies. The students also got to see the vision center, floral department, and customer service. They had a wonderful time.

Following the tours, the two classes went to Oleson Park for a picnic lunch. The park is run by volunteers and operates on donations. The children were delighted to visit a petting zoo at the park after lunch. They also enjoyed seeing other animals on display. A terrific day was had by all!



## Nurse Notes

It's hard to believe another year is done. We have enjoyed watching your children grow and look forward to seeing how much they change over the summer. Even though we won't be seeing your child on a daily basis for awhile, there are things you can do to help us prepare for the next school year.

**Immunizations:** If your child requires vaccinations over the summer, please don't wait until the last minute to get them done. This only makes the transition into a new school year more difficult. Also, please get a copy of the immunization record, so you have it when you register your child in August.

**Head Lice:** Parents, please spend 15 min. each week checking your child's head for signs of head lice and nits (eggs). The eggs are white and often attached to the shaft of the hair and won't just fall off easily. They cling to the hair and have to be pulled off between two fingernails. The adults are dark colored and are often more difficult to find, as they scurry away when you look for them. They like the dark warm places, such as the nape of the neck and behind the ears. If you discover your child has head lice, check with their doctor for what treatment to use to get rid of them. Then make sure to check everyone in the house AND treat everyone as needed. Don't forget to wash linens, caps etc. in very hot water (150\*). Stuffed animals, dolls etc. can be placed in an airtight bag for a month to kill the lice and eggs. Lice can live for 2-3 days off of the body, so if all of the household items are not treated, it is easy to get re-

infested. Help to prevent head lice by teaching your child to not share baseball hats, combs, pillows or any other object that comes in contact with their head.

Medications: If your child requires a medication at school, please remember you MUST fill out a BLUE medication form at registration OR anytime a med needs to be given at school AND it MUST be in an original container. Pharmacies know schools have this policy and are happy to give an extra labeled bottle for you to send to school. This applies to pills OR liquids. Remember, if it isn't in an original container WE CANNOT give the medication at school.

Food Allergies: If your child has a true food allergy, we have a yellow form that needs to be signed by a doctor or your doctor can fax the school at 712-843-2195. There is a difference between a food allergy and a food intolerance.

Vision and Dentist: We know many people get their vision checks and dental appointments during the summer. We have cards available to be filled out so we can document your child being seen for eye and dental exams. This is particularly important for the dental exam for kindergarteners. Stop in at school if you need a card.

Lead Test: Another thing being mandated by law is a lead check by the kindergarten age. You don't need to have anything filled out or bring a copy, but the state will get a list of kindergarten students and will check to make sure they have been tested.

As you can see, the school year doesn't end in the Nurse's office when the school closes for the summer. There are many things that you as parents can do to help the NEXT school year start smoothly! We hope you and your child/ren have a very safe and healthy summer! Oh, and please don't forget to use your sunscreen!
