

~I'm continuing to spend a few minutes every week in grades 1-6. While students swish fluoride, I've had a great chance to do some quick teaching on thankfulness, cold weather skin care, how often to change your toothbrush, and good ways to get some exercise indoors. I also showed them a picture of a magnified tooth, with its crevices and bacteria—what a great reminder of why we need to brush!

~AEA came to complete hearing tests on a number of our students in December.

~In February, we will celebrate Dental Health Month with a fun lesson in Kindergarten, talking about the parts of our teeth and how to take care of them.

~Brenda Thams, RN assisted me again this year with completing our annual height, weight, pulse, blood pressure, BMI and vision screens. The results were recorded in each student's health record, and also sent home with report cards. Please call me if you have any questions or concerns regarding the results.

~I like to remind everyone that cases of head lice are always a possibility, and the best way to deal with this situation is prevention! Remind your children not to share anything that comes into contact with the head. Also, do not pile coats and hats together in public places. The second best way to deal with lice is to catch them right away, so make sure you check the head of every child (and adult!) in your home once per week. This only takes 15 minutes, and is worth the time!

~Remember that washing your hands often is the best way to prevent illness. Even if your hands appear clean, we pick up germs all day long as we touch doorknobs, computers, railings, and phones, so make it a habit to clean your hands regularly, and also those frequently-touched surfaces in your home or office.

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Update from Mrs. Alanna Fuller, K-6 Resource Teacher

My name is Alanna Fuller and I am the Kindergarten through 6th grade Special Education teacher. Here is the special education room things are going great this year! We have been working on a lot of different things in my room. This year I have purchased new manipulatives called Wiki-Sticks which are pieces of yarn covered in wax. They come in many colors and you can bend and twist them and they don't break. We have used them to make numbers, letters, spell words and make fun things. We are continuing to use lots of technology in the classroom to facilitate learning such as the Smart board, Smart table, and Ipads. Recently my small group and I read a book on Japanese Internment camps in Idaho during World War II. We talked about what internment camps were and how it would feel to live in one. The main thing we learned about was theme. We used watched a short video on determining theme from learnzillion.com. The students really enjoyed learning from not only me but a video that they could watch over and over to better understand theme and apply it to other stories. Videos, movies and stories have been working so well in my room this year. My small group also had the opportunity to read a readers theater to the 6th grade class. They got to choose their own parts and read them over and over until they would read all of their parts fluently and share with the other class. I am blessed to have the opportunity to get to know all the students here at AC-T.

The new Reading Plus computer program is the only Common Core aligned reading intervention that prepares students to engage with complex text by developing all three dimensions of successful readers: capacity, efficiency, and motivation. Reading Plus develops a student's silent reading fluency, reading rate, and stamina that make reading comfortable and productive. Reading Plus provides an extensive library of engaging, cross-curricular informational and literary selections that follow grade-appropriate levels of vocabulary complexity, sentence length, and word count. This school year is the first time that students have been able to access the program through laptops and iPads.

January 27 -31. What grades take it? 2nd – 6th. Why do we take it? To see student growth from year to year. What awards can we get? Gold, Silver, and Bronze awards for percentile rank. Teachers are also setting goals for student improvement. When do we see the results? About a month after we take the test. How are the results used? They are used to support instruction or teaching in the classroom. How long do the tests take? Each test is different, but we usually test for about an hour and a half. Do we get snacks this year? The PACT will provide the students with a healthy snack each Day. We had a Pep rally on Jan 24th to get kids excited about testing. Some Buena Vista University athletes came and motivated the students to do their best in their tests and in everything they do in their life.
