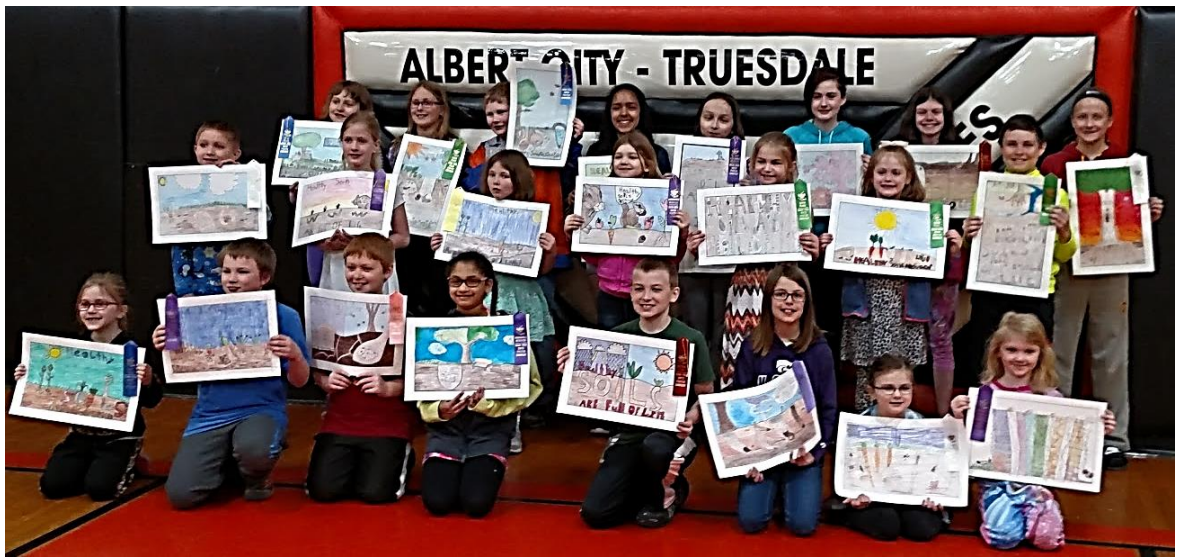

Students at AC-T again participated in the BV County Soil Conservation Poster contest again this year and we had 24 students who earned an award. There were 1,497 posters entered in BV County, so we feel very honored to have so many winners at AC-T.

This year each family received the book The World According to Humphrey that is told from the point of view of Humphrey the hamster who is a class pet. Notes from Mrs. Wildeman, School Counselor

On Thursdays during the 2016-2017 school year, I get to work at AC-T Elementary. I enjoy seeing the staff and students! I teach guidance classes to all K-6th grades, and provide individual sessions for counseling and social skills training to three or four students on average each week. The Elementary School Counseling Program at Sioux Central and Albert City-Truesdale focuses on the academic, career, and social/emotional development for every student. The school guidance curriculum aligns with the American School Counselor Association's standards and includes lessons about: Academic - academic self-concept, improved learning, school success, achieving goals, relating school to life experiences; Career - career awareness, employment, career information and knowledge to achieve goals; Social/Emotional - self-knowledge and application,

interpersonal skills, and personal safety. As needed, I consult with the principal and teachers about the unique needs of students.

Guidance lessons for fourth, fifth and sixth grades have covered gossip, rumors, bullying and conflict resolution. Lessons for second and third grade have been about The Seven Habits of Happy Kids (Sean Covey), the Six Pillars of Character, and self-esteem and strengths. Kindergarten and first grade have learned more about working with others, the Six Pillars of Character, feelings, and healthy choices.

Nurse Notes

Welcome to Spring! It's certainly been a busy winter in the Nurse's office...

~I continue spending time in every class each week, discussing health-and-wellness issues. Some of the more recent topics include bike safety, wound care, caffeine use and sources of good energy, eating a good breakfast, and seat belt safety.

~Even though the weather has been improving, we are still seeing lots of stomachaches, sore throats, coughs and fevers. Please remember that if your child has a fever, they must be *fever-free without the use of fever-reducing medications* (such as Tylenol or ibuprofen) for 24 hours in order to return to school. This is not only for the protection of other students and staff, but in order for your child to heal fully and be ready to learn when they come back to school.

~Washing your hands is the single best thing you can do to prevent illness. Many schools and daycares practice washing hands upon entering the building or classroom; why not do this at home as well? It is a quick and easy way to stop the outside germs from being spread all over your home!

~A reminder...Head lice exist wherever there are children. We do our best to prevent students from sharing any hair articles, hats or hoods, and provide separate space for each child's coat and personal items. Please do the same, and continue to check the head of every child in your home, every week, for at least 15 minutes.

~As you look ahead to the next school year, make your appointments now for those summer doctor, dentist and vision exams, and ask your doctor or nurse about any immunizations your student may need (there are requirements for PK, K, 7th and 12th grades). If you wait to call for those appointments this summer, you may have a hard time getting in; and, the worst way to start a new school year is by scrambling to get those things done at the last minute when the offices are busy! The requirements for immunizations can be confusing, so it is best to ask your doctor or nurse which ones your student needs, if any, and make sure they are given at the right time.

Can you make your child “smarter” this summer? By Mrs. Sievers

Through my years of teaching and working with children of differing ability levels, I have heard parents comment, “Oh, they are so lucky, their kids were born smart.” But in reality, genetics count for only about half of our intelligence. Environment and other factors account for the rest. I tell students that our intelligence is “Use it or lose it.”

So here are some tips to keep your child’s intelligence growing all summer.

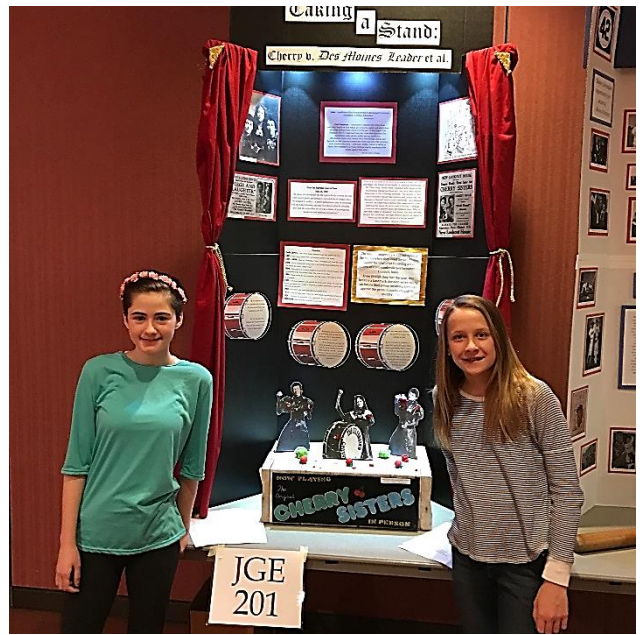
1. Ask relatives to give experiences instead of gifts. A trip to a museum, a concert, a sporting event, etc. can spark interest in something new and increases vocabulary. This is more challenging living in a rural area, but it can be done! Many of these events cost less than the latest video game and don’t take any storage space.
2. Set aside time each day for media-free time. This means parents as well as kids. Talk, play a board game, eat, take a walk, color, do a puzzle, but enjoy some “unplugged” time where no one is staring at their phone. This will be challenging at first, but you will all get better at it if you practice.
3. For younger kids – put your recyclables into an “inventor’s box”. They will have fun creating with paper towel rolls, Kleenex boxes, etc. And tape, lots of tape! Have them tell you about their creation or even write directions for how to use it.
4. Encourage a hobby. Collect something. Learn more about a sports team or player. Take a music lesson, swimming lessons, a painting class. Try a new recipe together. Go fishing, hiking, bird watching, canoeing. Join 4H or Girl/Boy Scouts. Everyone should be an “expert” at something. If your child is interested in something you don’t know much about – learn together.
5. Use the library for more than just the computers. Some tech time at the library with friends is fun. Offer your child a little extra time if they also bring home something to read.
6. Talk in the car! Try not to get in the habit of turning on the DVD player on short trips. For younger kids, talk about what you see – count how many cars you meet in a mile, or what color the house was you just passed. For older kids – talk about one thing good in their day, or something that disappointed them. Have them help you read a map – don’t just ask Siri –look it up on a map too! Sing along with the radio. Tell them about the memory a certain song has for you.

None of these suggestions has to be expensive. But they do require a little time and thought. Give one a try, and watch your child’s brain grow!

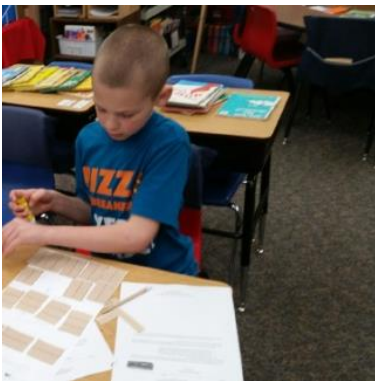
Fourth Grade News by Ms. Dirks

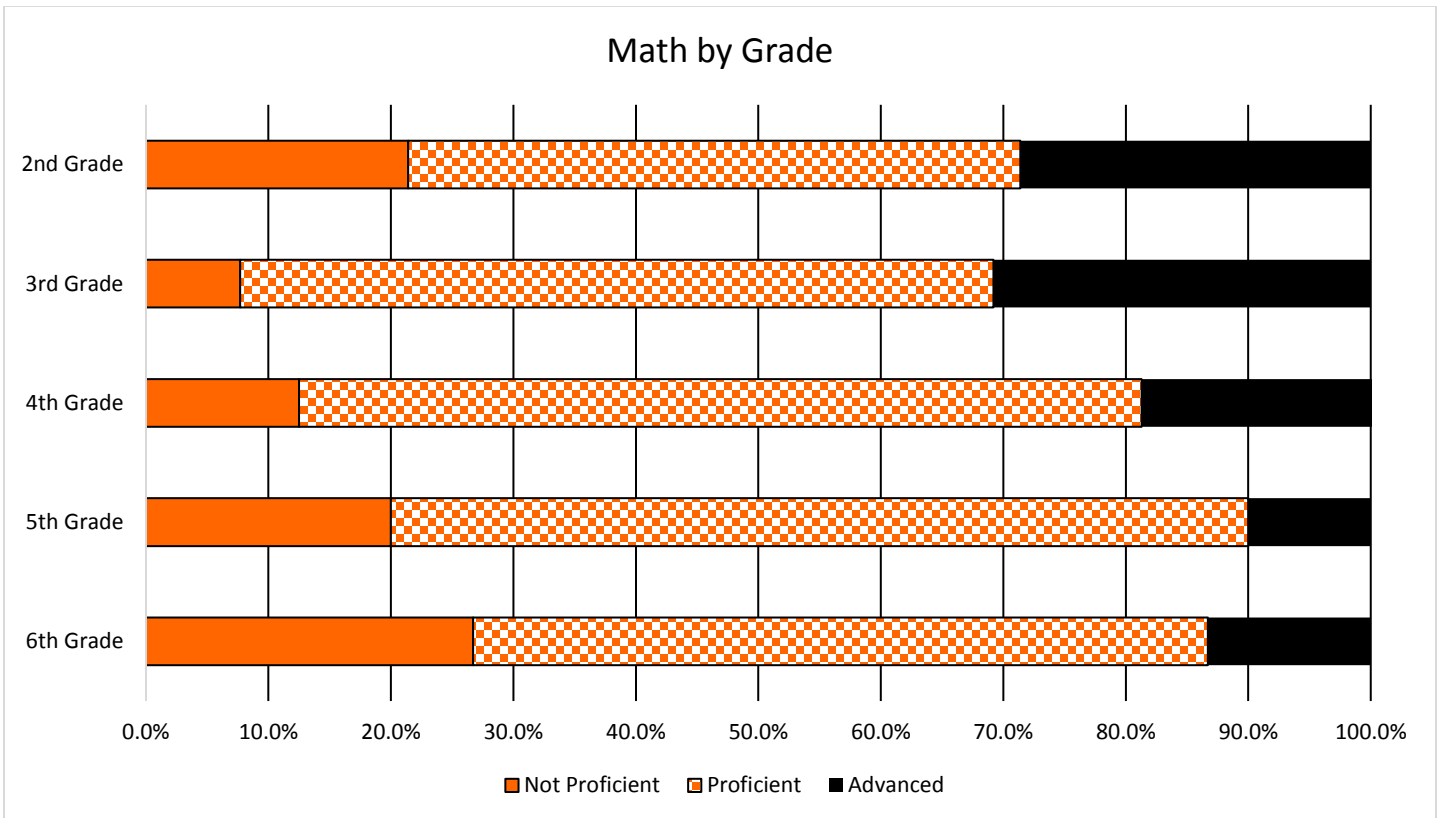
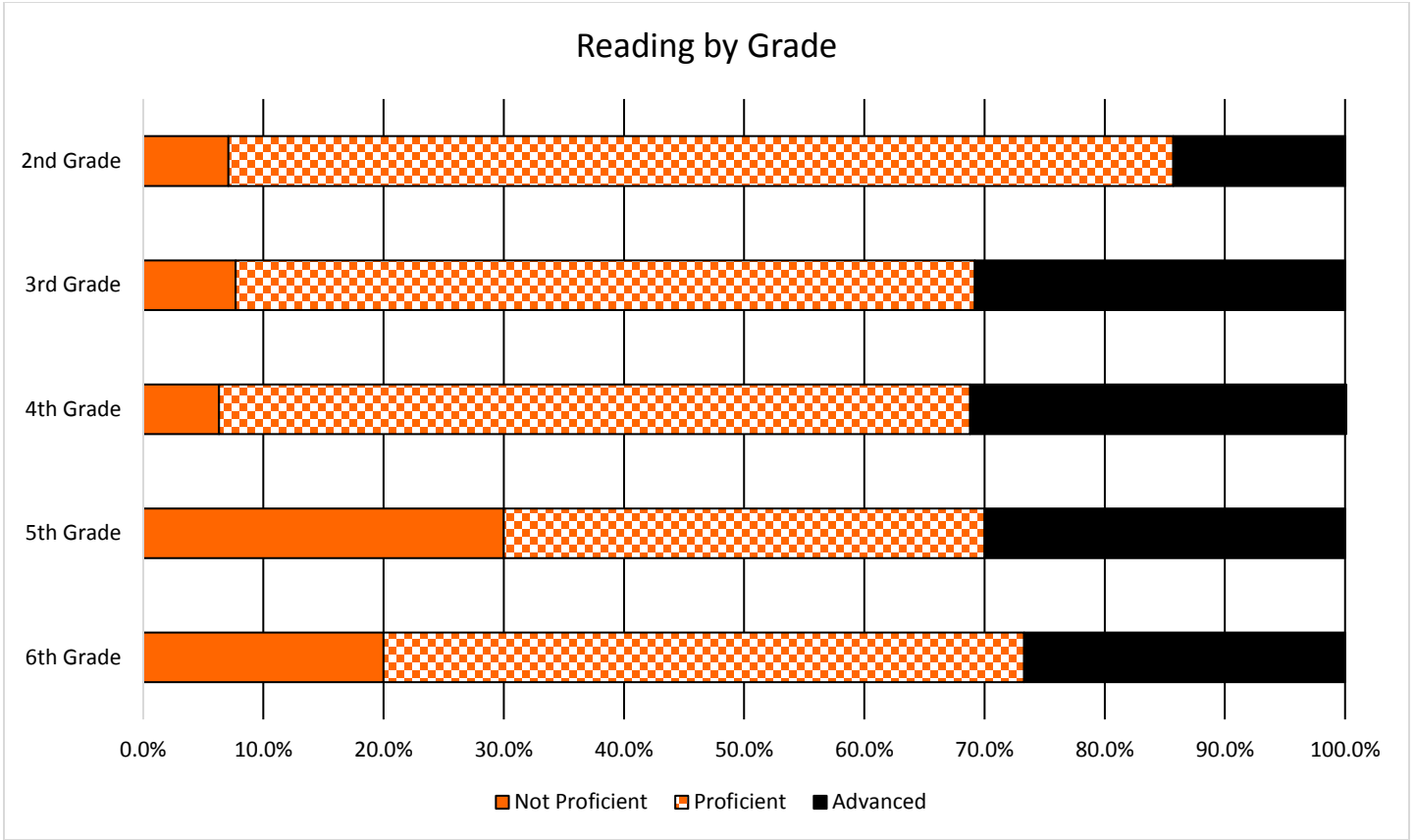
I interviewed several students and staff about what makes you like AC-T.

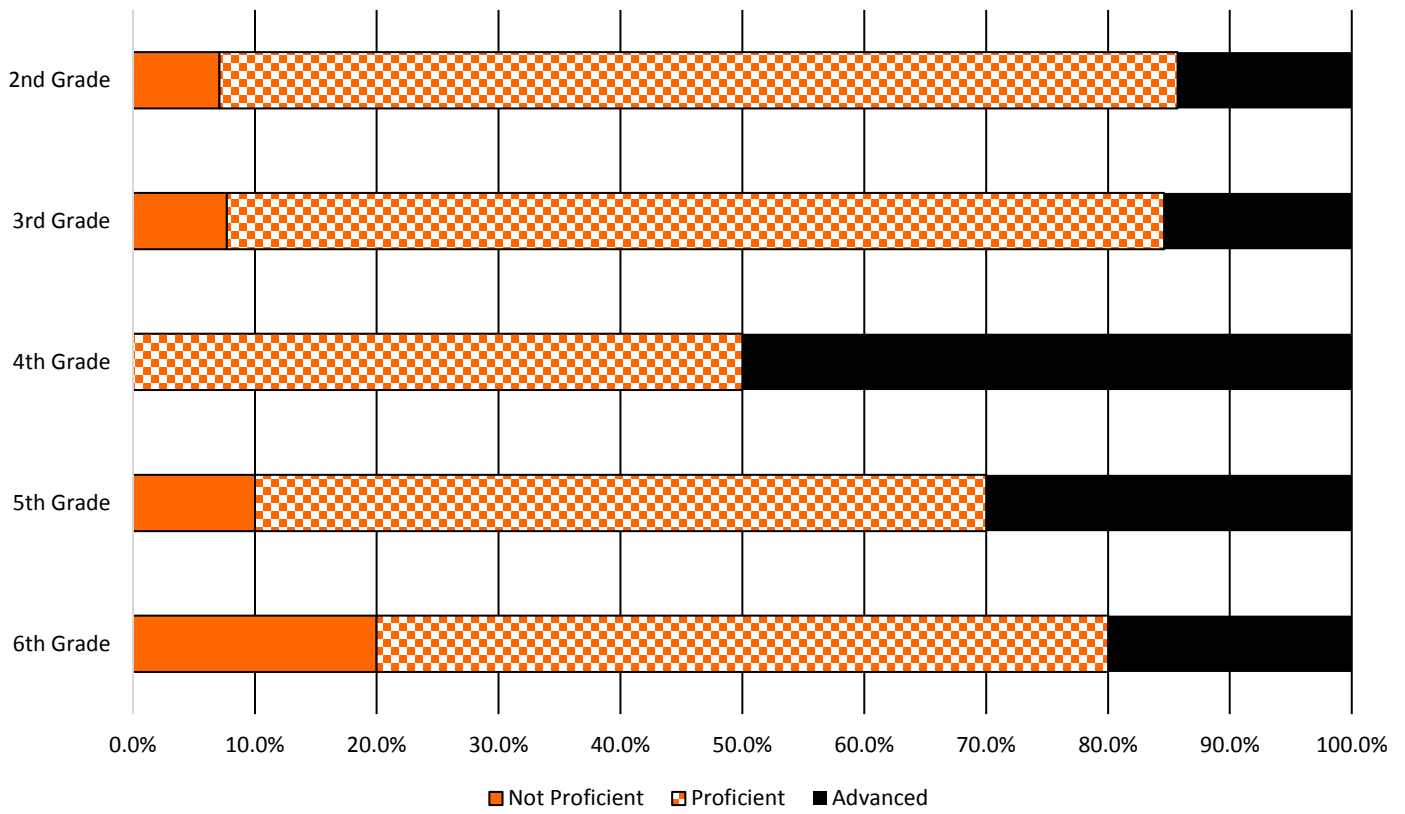
This is Taylor Melby By Preston Harder

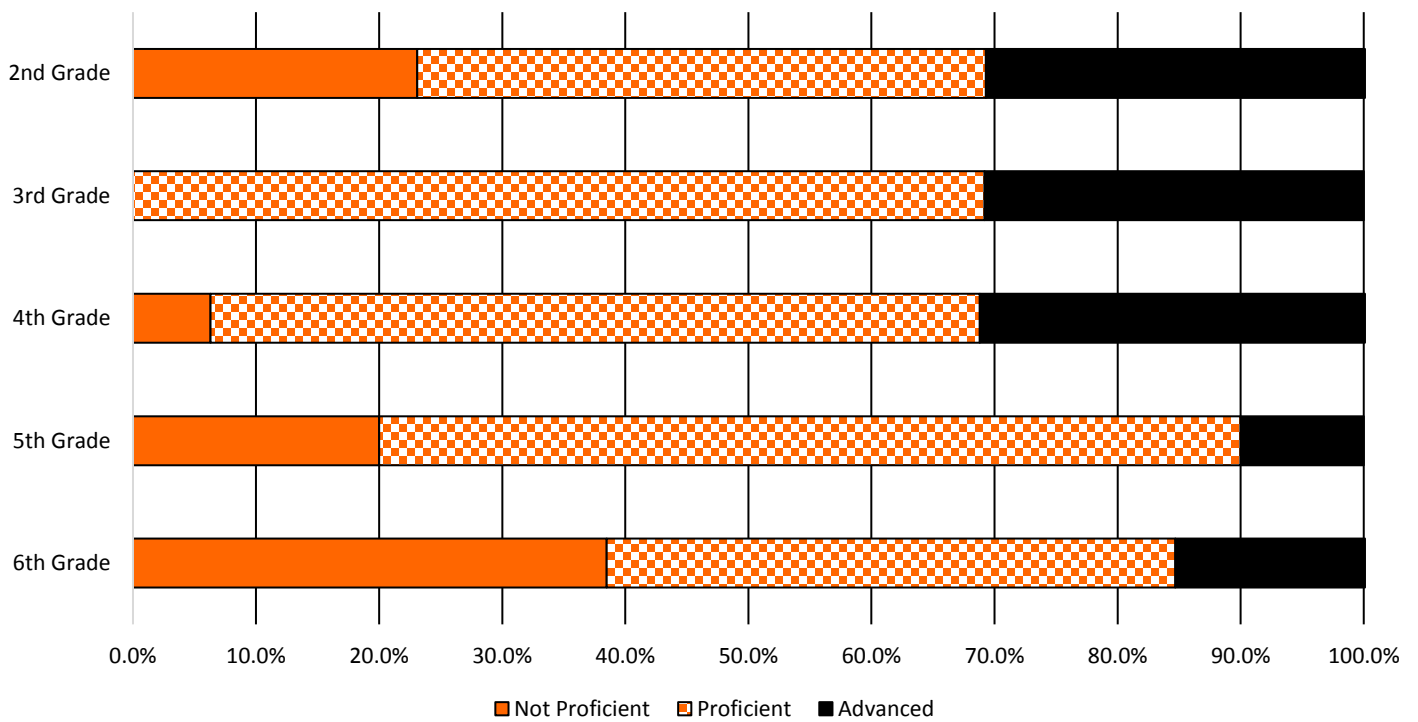
Iowa Assessment Results Grades 2nd-6th for 2016-2017

Science by Grade

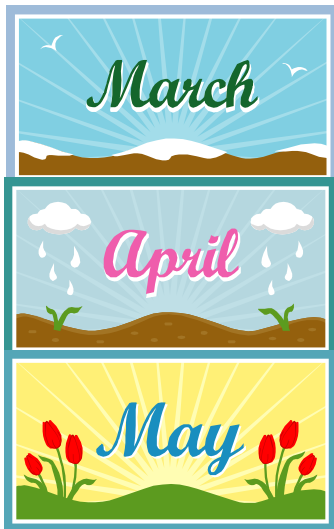
