Welcome to summer! It continues to be such a privilege for me to spend time with our students throughout the year...

Summer is a great time to make sure your child sees their doctor, dentist and eye doctor. Students entering Kindergarten in the fall need both a dental and vision screen. Those who will be in 3rd grade need to have a vision screen completed. Certain immunizations are required for PK and K students, and those going into 7th grade. It's a good idea to call *now* and make all of those appointments, and take the opportunity to visit with your care providers about any concerns you have. The summer goes so quickly, and

it's so much easier to complete these early on, rather than during the last few days of summer break!

Remind your family members not to share anything that comes in contact with the head. It's a great idea to check the head of everyone in the house every week, so that any infestation can be caught early. Lice don't take a summer vacation!

What is screen time? Simply, any time in front of a screen, whether a TV, a computer, a tablet, a smart phone or playing video games. Children are spending, on average, 7 hours per day on screen time, while the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that children spend no more than 2 hours per day. Think about ways you can reduce the hours your family spends in front of a screen, especially while the weather is nice! Why not take a "vacation" and try a screen-free week this summer?

Art at AC-T Elementary by Andrea Bean

I learned a beautiful word from Max, a full blood Blackfoot Native American Indian that has become a dear family friend. He not only fixes our personal computer, but he has taught us many things about the Native American culture. He always greets us with the word "HAYHONAWASHDA." (Sorry, I have no idea how to correctly spell that word!) He said just think "hey, honey it's wash day" then you'll remember how to say it. It's how the Blackfoot people greet one another instead of Hi or Hello. Loosely translated It means; I acknowledge you, I value you, you are important to me, and I want to spend time with you.

So, this became the word that started each art class. It was also the word spoken when we weren't valuing one another. A quick reminder for each of us.

It's been another busy year that's gone by all too fast. The art time always seems to fly by. I find myself trying to teach all ages and levels of art to use many different kinds of art media. Whether it's drawing with color crayons, craypas, chalk, charcoal, pencil, ultra-fine markers or weaving with paper, yarn, pipe cleaners, newspapers or fabric. There are always new possibilities. They've discovered brown paper sacks have endless recyclable potential. They make wonderful paper looms to weave on, cut in to various size pieces they are great to draw on (Even Edgar Degas and Henri Matisse used brown paper sacks.) When you crumple paper up and flatten it out again, it gives your work a whole different look.

I'm often asked from parents with young children what they can do to help their budding little artists. My answer is simple, purchase a cheap set of watercolors, a small bottle of glue, a simple set of crayons and a small semi-pointed scissors. Then set them down at the table while you are making a meal and can watch them work away. I usually have a plastic table cloth left over from a birthday party. I put that down on the table and when they are done, I fold it up after it dries and it's ready to use again and again. Newspapers spread out will do the same thing and you can throw them out when you are done.

Children love to paint. Don't be concerned with the end product. Just let them have fun figuring out how a paint brush works and color.

Note I recommend a semi pointed scissors. That's only if you, as an adult are around to teach them scissors safety and how to use them. I ask you, have you ever tried to cut with a blunt ended scissors? Frustrating isn't it! Practice cutting with your child. Draw straight lines, curves lines, and pointed lines on the back of advertisements and old envelopes. As they get better at cutting, have them cut around large magazine pictures. The reason I use recycled things for cutting practice is because the child realizes it's a learning thing and they aren't so concerned with perfection of cutting. They allow themselves to make mistakes. The scissors thing really helps with eye hand coordination and sets them up for success in school.

Besides paint, kids for the most part love to glue. Forget the glitter in the glue, it doesn't stick as well and that top that has the flat edge to spread the glue around is constantly clogged. Besides using ones fingers to smear the glue around is great tactile experience. Hands and fingers are washable. Their thinking skills tell them to put a whole lot of glue on...that way it will be sure to stick. Try to teach them that a little dot of glue all over the outer edges does the trick. You don't have to buy paper. Let them use scrap paper, newspapers, magazines, or brown paper bags that you've cut open and laid flat on the table. As far as color crayons are concerned, buy the eight pack. This helps them learn and recognize their basic colors. Too many fancy names and too many options only confuses them. Once again, keep it simple applies to art as well as life in general.

As most of you that know me, I'm not a big one for school art contests at the elementary level. First of all every organization sponsors a poster contest. If we participated in all those that were offered, that's all we'd get done. We have, however, always participated in the soil poster contest at AC-T while I've been the art teacher. I've done this because I feel it is relative to this area that we live in.

We started the fall out being notified that Berkley Johannsen's Soil Conservation poster that won first place in the third grade division for Buena Vista County's 2014 Soil Poster Contest also won on the state level and went on to national competition. This is the first year that Buena Vista County has had representation on the National level in this contest. What an honor. Congratulations to Berkley!

I never want to convey that winning an art contest is the be all and end all of their particular art work. I've seen what I thought were some wonderful pieces of art work that were never recognized. I think it's more important that they learn something about the subject of the poster, did they enjoy creating their own idea and did they do their best? With that said, this year I did open the KICD Christmas card contest up to the 4th and 5th graders. They voted on if they wanted to participate. We were

fortunate enough to have the winner, Paige Eral. She was chosen to have her design put on the KICD Christmas card and \$200 for the art department in her school. Wow, \$200! After looking through the art catalogs and talking with her 5th grade classmates together they decided to order scratch art paper and pens with this monetary gift. Thank you Paige and KICD for making this new equipment available for next year. Sara Feeley, Isaac Albeus and Berkley Johannsen also placed in the Christmas card contest.

We just finished participating in this year's Soil Conservation Poster Contest. The theme this year was probably one of the easiest for elementary students to understand. (Believe you me, some years I've wondered where that theme came from for elementary students!) It was "Local Heroes...Your Hardworking Pollinators." The students all did a wonderful job, I can't remember when we've had so many high quality pieces of work. Judging this contest has to be hard! We were excited to have 21 students place in this county wide contest. There were 2 firsts places, 1 second, 1 third, 3 fourth places, 3 sixth places and 11 honorable mentions. Those who placed were Pre-K Chloe Shannon, Alexa Peterson, Makayla Scruggs, Kindergarten -Henry Stepec, Brogan Johannsen, 1st grade-Reata Ayers and Lindsay Peck, 2nd grade-Leah Bean, Addilyn Johnson, and Kylie Anderson, 3rd grade-Kurtis Wood, Addisyn Fuchs and Gavin Thams, 4th grade-Gregory Anderson, Brody Jones and Deklan Willeford, 5th grade-Isaac Albeus and Ethan Schultz and 6th grade-Jonathon Wilson, Tristan Loving and Alyssa Willeford. On Tuesday, May 3rd, our two 1st place winners; Reata Ayers and Leah Bean collected their prize. They went up in an airplane and flew over Storm Lake. Thank you to the Buena Vista County Soil and Water Conservation District for making this opportunity possible for the students.

This contest takes about 6 weeks out of the art classroom time plus the time the individual classroom teachers give to the students so they can finish up their posters by the due date. Once again it's everyone here at AC-T working together that makes this all happen! So thank you students and fellow staffers! I'm proud to say that I work here at AC-T with such fun kids and supportive staff. I feel very blessed!
