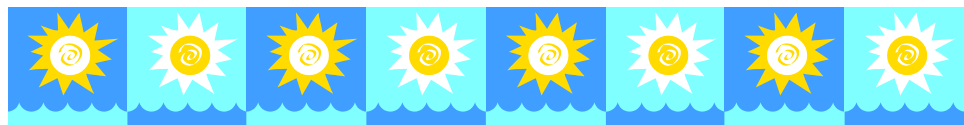

## Moving Forward by Jeff Dicks, Superintendent

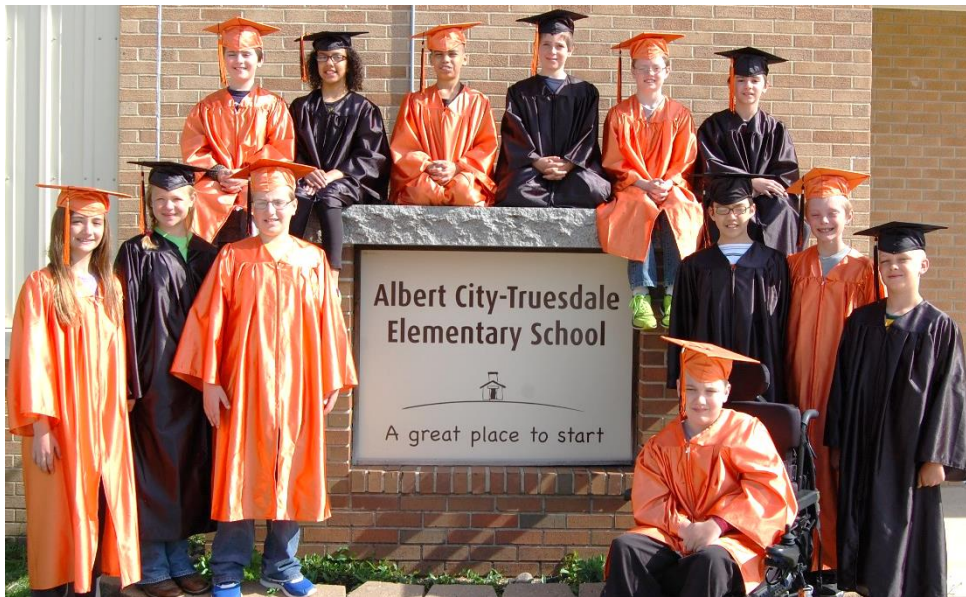

already! Students who will be in Pre-K or Kindergarten next fall need to have certain immunizations in order to attend. All 6<sup>th</sup>-grade students need to have their Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis) vaccine updated before they start 7<sup>th</sup> grade in the fall. Please visit with your healthcare provider about any vaccines your child may need. Nationally, immunizations provide protection against millions of potential illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths, so it is important to keep those up-to-date!

Happy summer! I'm glad to have spent another great school year with our students. Here are a few reminders...

Immunizations: Now is a great time to make that summer appointment to see your doctor, if you haven't

Dental and Vision Checks: All Kindergarten students are required to have a dental screen. Dental offices have that form available, so please ask your dentist to fill that out. However, all students should see their dentist and eye doctor every year, and summer is a great time to get those scheduled!

Medications: Any students who need to take medications at school next year must have parent permission to do so. This applies to prescription and over-the-counter meds, whether taken the whole year or short-term. There is a "Consent Form for Medication at School" that needs to be filled out and signed before we can administer any meds. Please remember that all meds must be in the original container or packaging, and can only be brought to and from school by an adult, never by a student. This form is available on the school website, under "Resources".

Head Lice: Please make it a habit to check the head of every household member weekly for 15 minutes. Lice don't take summers off, and there are still opportunities for an infestation! Continue to remind your children not to share anything that comes in contact with the head.

Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions or concerns regarding your child's health or the requirements for school. I'm happy to speak with you anytime. Have a wonderful summer break!

## Art at AC-T Elementary by Andrea Bean

Things in the art room at AC-T have been moving along again this year. I can hardly believe that it's the end of the year and summer vacation is fast approaching. "Art doesn't have to match your sofa," is a sign that is outside the door to the art room, I put it there to make the students realize in our all so perfect home decorating themes, art is what you personally like and want in your home. Sometimes, you like it because of the joy it gave you in creating it.

We have covered a vast amount of art medium this year, as I believe my job as elementary art teacher is to expose the students to as much art media as I can in their years here at AC-T. Our 40 minute classroom periods sometimes limit the amount of work we get done, as a project sometimes takes up to six weeks to complete. My main art teaching philosophy is more about exposing the students to different things than the end product itself. This year we did weaving with yarn and paper, pen and ink work, measuring with rulers and making frames for our art work, watercolors, as well as tempera paint and drew with colored pencils, pencil, crayons and charcoal and touched on some form of print making. The 6<sup>th</sup> grader finished up their Iowa Quilts and at this writing, I am busy trying to get them all sewn together. They will be on display at 6<sup>th</sup> grade graduation night.

Each month we studied an artist and their work, along with one public piece of art work. Do you know the three most recognized paintings in the world? One of them is by an Iowan artist, Grant Wood, his painting of the "American Gothic." The house he used in the background of the couple can be found in Eldon, Iowa. It made for a fun one day trip for Mer and me. The little town of Eldon has a museum next to the house and it's filled with all sorts of things about Grant Wood and many paradox take offs on this famous picture. You can even pose in front of the house using look alike clothing they have for you to use. His dentist and sister posed for the original painting. Yeah Iowa! The other two most recognized paintings are done by an Italian and a Norwegian; Leonardo Da Vinci's "Mona Lisa," and Edvard Munch's "The Scream." Last years' public piece of art work was the Statue of Liberty, this year we studied Mount Rushmore. Ask your children about these pieces of public art work, I'm sure they can share a lot of information about them!

As an art teacher I'm always bomb barded with all sorts of opportunities to participate in poster contests. They all are good. On Monday, April 21<sup>st</sup>, Mavis Loving, Heather Totten, Elizabeth Perry, Deb Falkena, Bailey Speer, Alanna Fuller, Dj Wenell, Keara Cormany, Kelly Wolff, Andy and Mer Bean, and Twila and John Lange all met in the old Ag Shop to pull the tabs off the pop cans that people donate to AC-T. For years now, the community has been most gracious in donating their pop cans in a container to the north side of the



Crossroads building. The money from the pop cans go to funding special events, speakers, trips, and those extra special things that the student council sponsors for the students here at AC-T. They worked from 3:30 to 8:00 PM. They enjoyed some goofy relays and simple competitive games with the cans. We then donned plastic gloves and pliers to "pop tabs". Around 6:30 we stopped briefly for a contributed supper and then went back to work. It was a fun night of fellowship and helping others.

Just a few facts that we

thought were interesting.

1. There are 309 Ronald McDonald Houses in 57 countries. These houses are to be used for family members that have children that are ill.
2. Iowa has 3 Ronald McDonald Houses located in Sioux City, Iowa City, and Des Moines.
3. Mercy Medical Center in Des Moines has a Ronald McDonald Family Room. These rooms are for families of critically ill children. There are 98 Ronald McDonald Family Rooms in 10 countries.
4. Oct 15, 1974 the first Ronald McDonald House opened in Philadelphia. It was started by a Dr. Audrey Evans, Philadelphia Eagles football player, Fred Hill (whose daughter Kim had leukemia), Eagles football team, owner and general manager, and McDonald's owners and operators of Philadelphia. Fred Hill noticed that there were several parents and family members living at the hospital when they had sick children. He thought it would be a good idea to have a place for these people to stay instead of trying to sleep/live on the chairs at the hospital. He brought this idea back to his teammates as well as the Doctor...and from there it happened!
5. Minneapolis/St. Paul Ronald McDonald Area started the pop tab recycling program in 1987. Last year, the Midwest Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) took in \$30,000 worth of pop tabs. It might not seem like a big deal...pop tabs, but if you've ever seen or had a sick child that needed hospitalization, the Ronald McDonald Houses are a real blessing to them and their families. Something so small can help do something so huge for someone else at a traumatic time in their life. We are planning on having a Ronald McDonald tab container in the central hallway so the students can see the tabs accumulate. If anyone in the community wants to donate tabs, please feel free to bring them in to the school or send them with a student. The staff will have another "Tab night" next fall and again in the spring. We want to thank all of you who donate your cans to the school. We appreciate it!

# Tips for Preventing the Summer Slide



Studies show that children who do not read or have access to books during the summer lose up to 2 months of reading performance. Those losses accumulate during the elementary school years so that by the time a child enters middle school he/she may be 2 1/2 years behind! All children, whether from low, middle or upper income families, may fall victim to the "summer slide" if not provided with summer reading opportunities. So how do we prevent the summer slide-or even accelerate reading growth? Here are a few ideas:

- 1** Visit your local library! Help your child find "right fit" books. Right fit books are books that are of high interest to your child and are not beyond their reading level. You can use the five finger test to determine if the book is too difficult for your child. Open the book to a page with many words. Have your child begin reading the text. Hold up a finger for each word he/she does not know. If you have 4 or 5 fingers up, the text may be too difficult for your child to read independently. Feel free to still check out the book! It just may be a book you want to read with your child.
- 2** Be sure your child reads at least 20 minutes a day. According to research, a child who reads only 1 minute a day outside of school will learn 8,000 words by the end of sixth grade where a student who reads 20 minutes outside of school will learn 1,800,000 words! That's huge! If reading isn't one of your child's top priorities, you may need to set up an incentive program.
- 3** Set a good example. When your child sees you reading and enjoying a book or a newspaper article, you are sending a message that reading is important and valuable.
- 4** Read to your child. When you read to your child, he/she hears the rhythm of language. Be sure to read with expression! Changing your voice for different characters and increasing your volume during exciting parts are only a few ways to keep children engaged.
- 5** Read with your child –explore different types of reading such as poetry. For our little ones, poetry is a great way to improve phonemic awareness skills as poetry often incorporates rhyme. For our older children, poetry is a means of improving fluency.
- 6** Read for different purposes. Reading directions for a recipe or directions for assembling a toy are fun ways of incorporating reading into everyday activities.
- 7** Play games with words. Commercial games such as Apples to Apples improves vocabulary. You can easily turn a game of hopscotch or 4 square into a game that incorporates learning letters or sight words. Be sure to check out the "8 Super Summer Sight Word Activities" on the Make, Take & Teach blog.
- 8** If you have access to an iPad, there are tons of interactive books and apps that address phonics and early reading skills. There are also many websites that offer free reading related games.

Have a happy and healthy summer! Be sure to read, read and read some more! Not only can we prevent the summer slide, we can accelerate reading growth.

### **Program Overview**

Early ACCESS, formerly known as Iowa's System of Early Intervention Services, is a partnership between families with young children, birth to age three, and providers from local Public Health, Human Services, Child Health Specialty Clinics, area education agencies (AEA) and other community programs. The purpose of this system is for families and staff to work together in identifying, coordinating and providing needed services and resources that will help the family to assist their infant or toddler to grow and develop.

### **Age Requirements & Eligibility**

An infant or toddler under the age of three (birth to age three) who:

- Has a condition or disability that is known to have a high probability of later delays if early intervention services were not provided, or
- Is already experiencing a 25 percent delay in one or more areas of growth or development.

### **Services**

The family and providers work together to identify and address specific family concerns and priorities as they relate to the child's overall growth and development. In addition, broader family needs and concerns can be addressed by locating other supportive services/resources in the local community for the family and/or child. All services to the child are provided in the child's natural environment including the home and other community settings where children of the same age without disabilities participate.

Services required to be made available to children and families include:

- ➔ Service Coordination,
- ➔ Screenings, evaluation and assessment, and
- ➔ Development and reviews of an "Individualized Family Service Plan" (IFSP)

Other services, based upon individual needs, include:

- Assistive Technology
- Audiology
- Family/Training/Counseling
- Health Services
- Medical evaluations
- Nursing
- Nutrition
- Occupational Therapy
- Physical Therapy
- Psychology
- Service Coordination
- Social Work
- Special Instruction
- Speech Language Therapy
- Vision
- Transportation

### **Costs**

There are no costs to families for service coordination activities; evaluation and assessment activities to determine eligibility or identify the concerns, priorities and resources of the family; development and reviews of the Individualized Family Service Plan. The service coordinator works with the family to determine costs and payment arrangements of other needed services. Some services may have charges or sliding fee scales or may be provided at no cost to families. Costs are determined by a variety of factors that are individualized to each child and family.
