News from the AC-T Superintendent – Dr. Marlin Lode

Perhaps you heard of the discussions taking place in area schools regarding a study of a regional high school. At this point in time this is only a study – no decisions or commitments have been made by any of the participating schools. The goal of this study is to provide useful information to help area schools think long-term.

The Albert City-Truesdale Board of Education remains committed to its sharing agreement with Sioux Central. The two districts have a ten-year agreement for whole grade sharing with each other. Honoring that agreement is the pledge the of the AC-T Board.


Here are some questions and answers regarding the study of a regional high school:

What is a regional high school?

A regional high school is a single high school that serves any number of school districts. Districts would maintain their lower grades and funnel their high school students to the regional high school.

What purpose would a regional high school serve?

Declining enrollment causes a decrease in school funding, which affects educational opportunities for students. Therefore, individual school districts could combine their high school students and resources to ensure a high school that is large enough to offer a good variety of courses and activities. It would also provide a high school within a reasonable driving distance.



Albert City-Truesdale, Laurens-Marathon, Newell-Fonda, Pocahontas, Pomeroy-Palmer. The superintendent and two board members from each these districts serve on a steering committee to oversee the study.

Who will conduct the study?

The steering committee is seeking proposals from a number of third party companies and the Department of Education to do the study.

What information will citizens receive when the study is completed?

The steering committee expects to receive responses that address the following (partial

- How would quality of education be impacted?
- What is the expected enrollment?
- What is the most feasible location of the high school?
- What are the transportation issues?
- What are the building needs and how would they be financed?
- What are the tax implications?
- How can the information best be conveyed to citizens?
- What kinds of co-curricular and athletic programs could students expect?
- Is there a sufficient population in the area to sustain a high school well into the future?

Once the study is completed, are participating schools under any obligation?

No. Information gleaned from the study can be used by any of the schools and communities as they see fit.

Steering committee participants hope to receive an initial report of the study in January 2007. The members of the AC-T Board believe the results of this study will provide valuable information that can assist area schools and communities plan for their futures.

Brent Moens and Doug Rebhuhn Elected to AC-T Board

In the regular school board election held on September 12th, Doug Rebhuhn and Brent Moens were voted in for another three-year term on the AC-T board. Congratulations to Doug and Brent!

During their September meeting, board members elected Brent Moens President and Shelly Buse Vice-President of the AC-T board for the 2006-07 school year.



Enrollment Expected to Increase

Although the official count will not be taken until October 2nd, enrollment in the Albert City-Truesdale School District is expected to be slightly higher than the count taken in the fall of 2005. As of September 18th, the number of resident students was 248 compared to 238 last year. The number will likely dip after completion of the ethanol plant, as some of the students enrolled in our schools are children of construction workers involved with building the plant. Some of these families will be leaving our community around November 1st.

Vote to be Taken on Extension of Local Option Sales Tax
In their regular meeting of September 18th, AC-T board members adopted a resolution to ask voters if they wish to extend the Local Options Sales Tax to end on December 31, 2022. Currently the tax is in effect until 2014. All Buena Vista County residents will have an opportunity to vote on the measure. If approved, the one cent sales tax will be in effect through 2022. Revenue from the tax can be used by school districts for limited purposes including: reduction of property tax, maintenance and repair of buildings, new construction, large equipment items, and transportation equipment.

The AC-T board adopted a resolution to use the funds for the aforementioned purposes. The goal of the board is keeping buildings, grounds and school busses in good condition. If the infrastructure fund balance reaches a level that provides for emergencies, the revenue will be used for property tax relief.

The measure will likely come up for a vote in December. Please check with local media for date, time, and location of the election.

Board Discusses Moving the Playground

In their meeting on September 18th, school board members reviewed options for construction of a playground on the north side of the block on which the school building stands.

Principal, Barb Kady, and Superintendent, Marlin Lode, outlined options for consideration by the board. The initial plan calls for moving some of the existing equipment and purchasing a few pieces of new equipment. The new playground would be accessible and meet safety regulations. It would also eliminate the need for children to cross the street and closing the street during recess times. The board asked administrators to gather input from staff, students, and citizens to design the playground. The actual move would likely take place in the summer of 2007.

Storm Lake-Pilot Tribune Named Official Newspaper

The AC-T school board named the Storm Lake Pilot-Tribune as the official newspaper for the school district. The Pilot-*Tribune* provided the low bid for publication of legal notices.
