

Another school year is well under way in the Nurses' office! Nurses Deb and Julie continue to share the job of Albert City-Truesdale School Nurse...

- ~Nurse Deb continues to track all immunization records. She audits every student's shots to make sure all were given, and given at the right time. In addition to Public Health's audit of these records every fall, we need to be diligent to ensure that students are protected from some very serious diseases, and not risking spreading those diseases to others.
- ~Nurse Deb also takes care of offering flu shots to our school staff every fall. Have you had yours yet?
- ~Nurse Julie is again taking care of auditing records for dental screens. Every Kindergarten student is required by Iowa law to receive a dental screen, and the school is required to provide a compilation of those records to the state.
- ~Nurse Julie has also started fluoride treatments in October; with a parent's permission, first through sixth-graders receive fluoride once weekly. During the one minute of swishing, she has opportunity to teach uninterrupted! We cover many health-related topics, such as hand-washing and tooth-brushing, exercise and seat belt use, nutrition and skin care, serving sizes and thankfulness, and respiratory etiquette and lice prevention.
- ~Please refer to the school handbook for guidelines on when to keep your child home from school. A student with a fever (temp 100.0 F or greater) <u>cannot</u> be at school, and cannot return to school until they have gone 24 hours without a fever (without using Tylenol or ibuprofen).
- ~As always...Head lice exist wherever there are groups of children. We try to teach students not to share hair articles or hat and hoods, but as parents, you need to check your child's head every week. Spend 15 minutes combing and parting the hair; lice are very small, and like the warmth of the scalp. The eggs (nits) stick to the shaft of hair; they do not "flick" off, but must be pulled off between two fingernails.
- ~This December, we will be completing our annual "mini-physicals", which include height, weight, pulse, blood pressure and BMI (body mass index: a measure of body fat). At the same time, we complete a vision screen. Parents will receive the results of all these tests home after the first of the year.
- ~The AEA Audiology Department has completed hearing screens for all preschool, kindergarten, 2<sup>nd</sup> grade, and new students.
- ~Several of our staff members took a CPR, AED and First Aid class in September. They spent a morning in class, and finished by testing out and receiving certification. Congratulations to those who participated!

#### **Elementary Counselor News, by Mrs. Wildeman** Stress Solutions

Experiencing a wide range of emotions is normal and healthy. We can all benefit from practicing stress solutions and parents can model solutions for their children. Keep in mind, what works for one person, may not be preferred by another person, and not all solutions are appropriate in all settings. If children have an opportunity to practice a stress solution, they will be more likely to use it when they actually experience a strong emotion. When we observe children cope with their stress in a healthy way, we can praise them. Here is a list of some common stress-relievers that I share with students when they are experiencing strong emotions.

- slowly count to 10 and then choose my words carefully
- walk to a quiet place to think and find something to do that makes me feel better
- tell myself that reacting in anger won't help the situation
- take ten deep breaths
- use an "I" statement, for example, "I feel angry when you call me a bad name and I don't want you to do it anymore"
- accept that sometimes things just go wrong
- think of something that could have prevented the situation
- find someone to talk to about my feelings
- use clay, play-dough, or silly putty
- scribble a picture, tear up, and throw away
- finger paint
- tear up old newspapers
- write in a journal
- blow bubbles
- use positive imagery
- listen to music, sing, dance

### News from the AC-T Superintendent/Principal - Barb Kady

On behalf of the faculty and staff at school, I would like to wish all of you a happy holiday season! At your ACT school, we have enjoyed the wonderful fall season we have had this year, and we are also looking forward to the New Year, with many continued and new opportunities for students to develop and learn new skills.

We want to take this opportunity to say thank you to the Albert City and Truesdale communities for your support of your school. We are very grateful to live in communities that place the education of its young people at a high priority.

It was a privilege to present a program and to have local Veterans be our guests for lunch on Veterans Day again this year. We want to say a special thank you to Karl Lind for sharing one of the military vehicles in his collection as well as some other military equipment with the students, staff, and Veterans. Mr. Lind's participation in the Veterans Day activities at AC-T is so deeply appreciated!

Your Albert City-Truesdale school board continues to serve and represent you doing the business that keeps your school running smoothly. We would like to take this opportunity to thank retiring board member Jared Hays for his 7 years of service on the school board. School board members are dedicated volunteers who

continually seek to serve the communities that have elected them, to maintain quality programs and facilities for our students. We would like to congratulate Jessica Wood and Debra Clausen on being elected to the AC-T board in September. Thanks to all of our school board members for the work they do for AC-T.

One of the issues your school board and administration watches closely includes enrollment numbers. October 1 is the official count date for public school enrollment. Preschool enrollment counts are done on September 15. Both of these numbers are key factors in the school funding that is received from the state. Enrollment at the elementary level at AC-T has increased by 7 students this year, compared to the fall 2010 enrollment count, while the enrollment for grades 7-12 has decreased by 7 students. Changes in students open enrolled in or out of the district have an impact on the funding the district receives, as do the numbers of students who may be home schooled, but dual enroll into the district for select courses or activities, such as standardized testing. Weighing all of those factors, the district shows a decline of approximately 2% in enrollment for the fall of 2011. Declining enrollment trends, as well as cuts in state funding, present budgeting challenges for districts all across the state of Iowa. At the 2011 legislative session, Instructional Support State Aid was cut, Pre-School funding was reduced, and allowable growth was set at 0%. This year and next the district will see a drop in the amount of money it is allowed to spend, also known as the district's spending authority. The amount of spending authority a district has is directly related to how many students are on the enrollment count. Every effort is being made to maintain the spending authority of the district. Your AC-T school board and administration work diligently to oversee the budget and run the affairs of the district in a fiscally responsible manner, while maintaining quality programs for students.

Technology resources continue to enhance instruction at AC-T. The addition of 30 iPads and the purchase of another smart board help to provide students with a 1 to 1 computer ratio. Teachers continually work to incorporate the use of technology in new and innovative ways. Professional development for the AC-T faculty includes a study of differentiated instruction, helping to ensure the needs of all students are met through a variety of instructional techniques.

The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills (ITBS) will be given during the week of January 30, 2012. Students in grades 2 through 6 will be taking these assessments. These tests provide our faculty with important information regarding the educational progress students are making. Students can prepare for the ITBS by getting plenty of rest and eating a healthy breakfast each day. Throughout the school year, we ask that parents avoid making appointments for students that would cause them to be absent from school. This is particularly important during testing week. If you have questions regarding these tests, please do not hesitate to call the school.

With the winter season upon us, it is possible we may need to delay the start of school or cancel school for the day due to weather conditions that make travel to and from school dangerous. AC-T makes the decision on whether or not to hold classes in cooperation with the administration at the Sioux Central Schools. When Albert City-Truesdale cancels classes, Sioux Central will do the same. We will notify radio and television stations as soon as these decisions are made. You may listen to KAYL/Storm Lake, KICD/Spencer or watch KCAU/Channel 9, KTIV/Channel 4, or KMEG/Channel 14 to catch these announcements. On the AC-T website there is a link to sign up for the SNOWCAP Program, which will alert you with a text or email message should school be cancelled, or if there is a late start or early dismissal. There is also a link to sign up to receive the Sioux Central school cancellation notices. You may sign up for both if you wish!
