


### Fire Safety Week

We will notify radio and television stations of these decisions as soon as the decision is made in the morning. We are off to another great year at AC-T in the Nurse's office! There is one change this year: Nurse Deb has moved on to other things, so Nurse Julie is carrying out all of the duties as school nurse now. Please thank Deb the next time you see her for her years of serving the students here!

- ~One of the biggest jobs I complete every fall is organizing all of our students' health records, making sure teachers and other staff have the resources and equipment they need, and ensuring that the day-to-day flow of first aid, medications and health care goes smoothly.
- ~Another item of importance every fall is compiling immunization records; these are required for all students. I check each one to make sure students have received all of the necessary immunizations in the right time frame, and then Public Health audits our records, not only to ensure that we are in compliance with the law, but to prevent any cases of these lifethreatening diseases and illnesses.
- ~Our staff had the opportunity to receive flu shots here at school last month. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!
- ~My favorite part of being the school nurse is interacting with our students. In October, I started visiting the 1<sup>st</sup>- through 6<sup>th</sup>-grade classrooms weekly to complete a quick lesson on some aspect of good health. We'll start swishing with fluoride once it's available (it's currently on backorder), but until then, we're still covering everything from tooth care to hygiene, and respiratory etiquette to thankfulness!
- ~Please refer to the school handbook for guidelines on when to keep your child home from school. A student with a fever (temp 100.0 F or greater) or vomiting cannot be at school, and cannot return to school until they have been 24 hours without a fever (without using Tylenol or ibuprofen) or vomiting.
- ~A reminder: Head lice exist wherever there are groups of children. The staff and I teach students not to share hair articles or hat and hoods, but as parents, you need to check your child's head every week. Spend 15 minutes combing and parting the hair; lice are very small, and like the warmth of the scalp. The eggs (nits) stick to the shaft of hair; they do not "flick" off, but must be pulled off between two fingernails.
- ~This December, I will be completing our annual "mini-physicals", which include height, weight, pulse, blood pressure, BMI (body mass index: a measure of body fat) and a vision screen. I will send these results home to parents after the first of the year.

Please feel free to call me with any questions or concerns; I am at school on Thursdays, but am happy to be a resource to our staff and parents anytime, ensuring that our students are as healthy as possible!

## 6th Grade Field Trip By: Haylee Beckman




### Valero visits AC-T's 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Grades! By Mrs. Spragg, 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Teacher

Last month, Pete Krull and Christy Eral came to visit the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> graders. They gave an amazing presentation about the Valero plant in Albert City. They taught students the importance of safety in the plant. The students learned how corn is made into ethanol, which is a fuel used as a blending agent for gasoline. They also learned about other products made at the plant like distiller grains and corn oil. Distiller grains are sold as feed for cattle, hogs, and turkeys. Corn oil is sold to Bio-diesel plants to make diesel. After the presentation, everyone was treated with a bag full of cool stuff!!! Quick Facts found in the Valero pamphlet.-

• One bushel of corn yields approximately 2.8 gallons of ethanol and 18 pounds of distiller's grains.

- Approximately 110,000 bushels of corn are ground daily, producing about 308,000 gallons of ethanol and more than 1,000 tons of distiller grains.
- A single tanker rail car will hold approximately 29,000 gallons of ethanol, and they can

### News from the AC-T Superintendent/Principal - Barb Kady

AC-T is off to a great start to the 2012-2013 school year! We want to extend a special welcome to the new students, faculty, and families at AC-T this year.

This year, the AC-T faculty is joining together with 476 Northwest Iowa Teachers and Administrators from 10 school districts: AC-T, Alta-Aurelia, East Sac, Gilmore City Bradgate, Laurens-Marathon, Newell-Fonda, Pocahontas Area, Ridge View, Sioux Central and West Bend Mallard for collaborative professional development. This professional development is focused on improving student achievement through developing a deeper understanding of the Iowa Core/ Common Core Curriculum. Teachers and administrators will be creating common expectations for student achievement. These professional development sessions give our teachers an opportunity to engage and collaborate with teachers in grade and content alike peer groups from across the southwest portion of Prairie Lakes AEA. Teachers and Administrators are working together to help ensure everyone's students achieve greater success.

Teachers and Administrators from the above ten districts are coming together at three different sites. The Kindergarten through Second Grade Teachers meet at the Storm Lake AEA office. The remaining teachers are split between the Pocahontas AEA office or the Pocahontas High School. There have already been two full day sessions of work done this year, and there are two additional full day sessions scheduled for this school year.

Iowa's small rural schools have a long history of working together, forming consortiums and addressing emerging concerns collectively. Iowa teachers work to ensure their students have the best education possible. Bringing rural Iowa teachers together to have the opportunity to develop a common understanding of the Iowa/Common Core Curriculum, in a supportive environment where they can learn and share with their experiences, hopes and dreams for their students, is a wonderful opportunity for successful collaboration.

Teachers who teach in single section schools, such as AC-T, or those with only two or three sections have a limited ability to collaborate with others who teach the same grade level or content area. Bringing teachers together in grade alike groups gives them an opportunity to build relationships beyond their buildings and across district boundaries. These relationships have the potential to spill over into the classroom as teachers utilize technologies to connect their students with those across the consortium and beyond.

Collaborative professional development creates connections that deepen the learning for all those involved. Teachers engaged in studying the Iowa/Common Core Curriculum expand their knowledge and ability to apply the newly gained lessons in their classrooms. This researched based practice is known to help student achievement increase as teachers collaboratively build deeper and richer lessons, helping each other to stretch student learning further.

When we work together we are able to help everyone achieve success. As educational leaders, we want all of Iowa's teachers and students to be successful, not just those in our own districts. Coming together for collaborative professional development not only enriches our teachers' knowledge of the Iowa/Common Core Curriculum; it reflects our local School Boards' commitment to improved student achievement through their support of this effort. We would like to thank our Schools Boards for their work in aligning district calendars, and for providing the resources necessary to make this learning opportunity available to your teachers and in turn their students. It is great to see Iowa School districts working together to help everyone achieve success!

#### Author of Buck Wilder Visits Albert City-Truesdale and Sioux Central Schools by Paulette McCall

On Monday, November 5, Michigan based children's author and creator of the popular Buck Wilder nature adventure series, Tim Smith, visited Albert City-Truesdale schools and Sioux Central schools. Author and illustrator Tim Smith, aka Buck Wilder, published his first book "Buck Wilder's Small Fry Fishing Guide," in 1995 and since has written nine more books, all of which revolve around tales of the great outdoors.

Buck Wilder has been on a mission to get kids back to nature. "I spent a lot of time outdoors in my life," said Smith. "We're all connected to nature, and that's what my books are about. In today's time, kids are losing touch with nature." He has written ten books over twelve years, including titles, "Buck Wilder's Little Skipper Boating Guide," "The Ants Dig to China," "Buck Wilder's Small Twig Hiking & Camping Guide," and "The Squirrels Go Nuts," to name a few.

Beginning with his first book, "Buck Wilder's Small Fry Fishing Guide," Smith said he has always hidden a fuzzy white worm, suitably named "Fuzzy," on every page in his guide books. His paperbacks have black-and-white illustrations that animate when readers quickly flip the pages.

When talking to the students about the writing process, Smith said it takes him about a year to complete a book; the students were amazed when he described the process of drawing, writing, rewriting and editing, which has conditioned his love for pencils and erasers. "I don't care how big you get," he told the audience, "you're going to make mistakes." "Look at this," he said, showing the group a pencil. "I'm a little different. Most people might look at this and say, 'wow, great pencil.' But I look at it and say, 'wow, great eraser.' Erasers are on the end of pencils because everybody makes mistakes. But that's ok--you make a mistake, you can fix it. Don't be afraid to make a mistake."

Smith encouraged students to explore their imaginations and try new things, "even if someone laughs at you. I write under a pretend name with a pretend face," he said. "It's pretend because I need to use my imagination. Can you see this long face and bald head on a Buck Wilder book? No--I needed a character who looks and sounds rugged and outdoorsy." Tim Smith points out that he is no one particularly special--he is like many people, a husband, a father, literally the guy next door. Yet, with imagination, his world changes. This imagination drives his pencil in creating the Buck Wilder character and his forest friends of the wildly popular Buck Wilder Adventure series.

Buck Wilder's presentation was enjoyed by all elementary students, preschool-sixth grade. Before Buck Wilder's presentation, many students read his first book in the Buck Wilder Adventure series, "Who Stole the Animal Poop?" during library class. It quickly became a favorite book for all.
