

Kindergarten Registration

The Albert City-Truesdale Community School District invites all 2006-2007 kindergarten eligible children to a morning in the AC-T kindergarten room from 8:30-10:00 on Tuesday, March 28th.

Registration for children who will attend preschool in the fall are encouraged to register from 3:30-4:30 in the preschool room on that same day.

All updated immunization records and each child's birth certificate is needed for registration for both kindergarten and preschool. Parents are encouraged to notify the school if unable to attend these registration times.

AC-T Receives Reading First Recognition

The Albert City-Truesdale CSD received recognition from the Iowa Department of Education for being one of seven schools to make the greatest gains in reading achievement. Albert City-Truesdale accomplished this through the Reading First initiative.

To identify the schools, the Iowa Test of Basic Skills Comprehension and Vocabulary scores were converted to student level descriptors. Student scores were calculated to obtain the difference in scores for the 2003-2004 and 2004-2005 school years. These results were analyzed by grades.

The school is in the third year of the Reading First grant. Many hours of training and planning have gone into training teachers on researched-based strategies for teaching reading. The grant was written to include Kindergarten through third grades. The district invested into the plan to make it a school-wide effort.

Congratulations to the staff and students of Albert City-Truesdale CSD for this recognition.

On February 7, 2006 the Kindergarten class of Albert City-Truesdale visited the Buena Vista Regional Hospital. The school has been collecting for the Children's Miracle Network throughout the year. The students toured the facilities to see how the money might be used.

The tour started in a meeting room with Mr. Brad Strader. Two of the students presented him with about \$270.00 the school had collected since returning to school from the winter break. He thanked

the students and talked to them about what they would see on the next leg of the tour.

The students followed Mr. Strader up to the ward where the babies are kept. Two infants were there for the students to see. The class went into a hospital room where a mother might stay to have a child. They asked questions and got another glimpse of the babies before moving to the next area.

The class was taken down to the Physical Therapy unit. They saw the toys and equipment used to rehabilitate children with physical needs. They saw the whirlpool and got to experience using some of the equipment.

Each member of the class was given a ruler and crayons to create a picture of something they would remember about the trip. Those pictures were sent back to the hospital to be put on display.

As a special treat, the class was treated to lunch at the Dairy Queen. Dairy Queen is one of the corporate sponsors of the Children's Miracle Network. The students really enjoyed the lunch and ice cream before heading back to Albert City.





News firom the ART ROOM by Andrea Bean

It's been a fun year so far. The kids are great, the staff is very supportive and my room is convenient to everything. I'm at school teaching Monday from 11:30 A.M. to closing and the on Tuesday from 7:45 A.M. to 12:00 noon. It's a great schedule and it keeps me busy. I teach pre-school, kindergarten, and grades one through six.

We just finished up collage, stencil, story reading-drawing, wooden cuts out, clay, macaroni jewelry, brayer printing, and valentine's in the lower grades.

In fourth grade we're sanding, painting and putting our names on wooden blocks. Mrs. Bjork and I have collaborated on this project. Mrs. Bjork has helped in computer class to have the children pick a font for the lettering of their last names that will go on the blocks, while I've spearheaded the art part. It's been fun to see each student pick the colors and lettering that they each like.

In fifth grade, we've been making coil clay pots. It's proved to be quite the challenge since we only have art once a week. The clay wants to dry out too much to be workable for the next class period. We're finally getting this problem under control, and the pots are looking great. They have worked hard and have taken personal pride in their achievement. Justifiably so, as they are really nice looking coil pots.

Mrs. Wenell and I are working together on the sixth grade project, she teaches lowa history, and I'm reinforcing the lowa symbols by having each student make their own lowa sampler quilt. We are using a different media for each block. Block one is the goldfinch and we used fabric crayons on it. Block two is the wild rose, we appliquéd that one. Block three will be the oak leave and it's to be stenciled. Block four is the geode and it's going to have fabric and bead work on it. If you were to visit this classroom, you'd be amazed at how well these children work on quilt blocks. We will be looking for volunteers to help us assemble these into quilts by sewing them together when we get all the blocks done. If you are interested in volunteering, please call me or Mr. Baker any help would be appreciated.

I'm thankful for all the community support I've gotten when I put out a list of "things" we can use in the art room. Several people have donated, yarn, burnt out light bulbs, old CDs, and old toothbrushes. At present we have enough toilet paper rolls. We can use: glass mayonnaise jars, <u>any</u> cotton material, plastic canvas, yarn, sponges, buttons, beads, scrap lumber, sandpaper, liquid detergent (like Tide) lids and old CD's.

Once again thank you for what you contribute to the art program at AC-T. Whether it's encouragement, art materials, or appreciation of the arts in the school; it all benefits the children.

Can you believe that the school year is more than half over? The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills are completed and we are awaiting the results. Basketball season is almost finished and track starts. This school year is going by so quickly. We look to the future and wonder what it will bring.

I have been reading about changes that education may be going through in the coming years. I see statements that the little schools may be forced to close if not meeting the standards. They have plans for how high schools will respond to meet the changing needs.

From the Superintendent's Desk ~Marlin Lode

Greetings,

Albert City-Truesdale Community School's Board of Education met in a work session on Saturday, February 11, 2006. In the five-hour retreat, board members affirmed their commitment to a quality elementary school in Albert City and continued support for the shared middle and high school programs at Sioux Central.

The meeting opened with a report from Principal, Dave Baker. Mr. Baker outlined the results of student testing, with detailed information presented regarding the results of the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills. AC-T students meet the requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind law. Plans are underway to monitor the achievement level of students by grade, by groups of students as they move through the system, and for each student individually. Teachers will review an item analysis of the Iowa tests to determine the areas of strength and areas needing improvement in various curricula. Examples of items for review include: spelling, punctuation, reading comprehension, math facts, fractions, and decimals.

Board members held a preliminary discussion on the topic of the AC-T preschool. Board members suggested that the preschool policies offer more parent choice, by providing both full-day and half- day programs. Final action on this proposition will take place in a future board meeting.

Board members took time to look over current and projected enrollment. Enrollment in the AC-T Elementary School is expected to remain fairly stable over the next few years. The number of students opting to open enroll out of the district is going down. A plan for conducting a census of preschool children was discussed. In the coming months, board members hope to have these data available.

Because the AC-T building houses only an elementary school, there are portions of the building that are not occupied. In December, board members approved the initiation of a facility study to determine how the district could save utility costs and use the building in the most efficient manner possible. Board members began their review of the report. The report offers several options for reducing utility and maintenance costs. In the months to come, board members will continue their review to determine the best direction for the district.

The district enjoys a fairly strong financial condition; however, with future changes in the school funding formula, the district will need to monitor receipts and expenditures.

Before adjourning board members expressed their appreciation to the staff and community for supporting the students of Albert City-Truesdale. Board members are working hard to ensure that AC-T students receive an education that is unsurpassed anywhere.
