Albert City-Truesdale Students Qualify for State History Day and State Invention Convention!

Albert City – Truesdale Elementary School was host site for the 2010 District (AEA 8) History Day Competition. Twelve schools and about 100 total students from across Northwest Iowa participated.

The theme for History Day this year is "Innovation in History: Impact and Change." Twenty adult judges volunteered their time to critique group and individual entries in exhibits, documentaries, web

sites, performances, and research papers all relating to this theme. Two entries in each category were chosen to advance to the statewide competition in Des Moines on May 3.

Five Albert City – Truesdale 4th grade students attended the Invent Iowa district competition in Humboldt on Saturday, March 13. Invent Iowa teaches creativity through invention, using the academic areas of reading and research, science, creative and critical thinking, writing, art, and persuasive speaking. Each student or team of students creates a new product or





improves an existing one and presents their idea to a team of judges for evaluation.



Inventions created by the AC-T students include Mercedes Unger's Pencil Dispenser, Shera Smith's Boot Topper 2010, Makayla Bjork and Gabby Long's Tool Hammer, and Carter Beckman's Third Hand. Carter was chosen to advance to the state competition in Iowa City on April 24. His invention is a simple way to open doors for people whose hands are full.

American Legion Fifth Grade Flag Essay Contest

One of the goals of the American Legion of Iowa Essay Contest is to develop a deeper knowledge and appreciation for the United States Flag on the part of elementary-



level students. Other objectives of the contest are to gain knowledge of flag etiquette and respect for the flag.

The written essay, limited to 300 words or less, was to be the student's personal interpretation of what the United States flag means to them.

The contest was blind judged by members of American Legion Post 299 at their February 23, 2010 monthly meeting. Lexi Blakeley was the winner of the American Legion Post 299 Essay Contest. Lexi was awarded a Certificate of Achievement and a \$50.00 Savings bond on February 24, 2010 in an award ceremony at her classroom. All 5th grade students were given a Certificate of Participation from the Post, Freedom Certificates provided by the US Army, and pens, pencils, book covers and stickers provided by the US Navy.

Lexi's essay was forwarded to the 9th District offices for competition at the District Level. At District Level, Lexi will compete against winners from American Legion Posts in the thirteen counties representing Northwest Iowa. District contest winners will compete at State Level with the winner being announced at the July 2010 Department Convention.



The last few months have been quite busy in the nurse's office!

In December, we completed "mini-physicals" on our students. These included height, weight, blood pressure, pulse and a vision test. The height and weight were graphed on a percentile chart, and also used to calculate their BMI, which is a measurement of body fat. This information was compiled and sent home to parents, which is one way we partner with them in promoting optimum health for our students.

Nurse Deb prepared the immunization records for Public Health to audit in February; they complete an audit of these every year to ensure that all children received the correct immunizations at the correct time.

Nurse Julie completed an audit of dental screens; these screens are required for all Kindergarten and out-of-state transfer students. The state has mandated that dental screens be done for these students to promote better dental health in Iowa's children.

Nurse Deb prepared information to give out to parents on Pre-K/Kindergarten Roundup night (March 22). We invited all parents of students entering these classes in the fall to come and learn about AC-T; Nurse Deb and Nurse Julie are available to answer questions about immunizations and other health requirements for entering school.

Nurse Julie continues to administer fluoride every week to students (with permission) in first through sixth grade. She uses the minute spent "swishing" to encourage good habits in many areas, including dental care, exercise, eating and portion sizes, winter skin care, safety, basic first aid and having a positive attitude!

Just a reminder: The recommendations for prevention of head lice include parents checking the head of each child in the home for 15 minutes every week. Look carefully for nits (eggs) or lice. As lice can occur in any setting, we want to encourage you to take the time to do this every week.

We take care of any injuries, illnesses, aches or pains that occur while we are here at school, and are always happy to answer any questions. Please feel free to call anytime; Nurse Deb is here on Tuesday mornings, and Nurse Julie is here on Thursday mornings.



News from the Administration- by Barb Kady

As we reflect during the final quarter of the 2009-2010 school year, we know we have accomplished many things at AC-T throughout the school year. This newsletter is a reflection of some of those achievements. As we look to the final weeks of the school year, there are still many things we are looking forward to!

Our faculty is in the process of developing a district implementation plan for the Iowa Core Curriculum. The Iowa Core Curriculum:

- Is about the success of all students;
- Communicates the expectation that all students learn at high levels;
- Honors prior work districts have done to develop curriculum;
- Focuses on 21st century skills;
- Includes state content standards;
- Encourages instructional practices that deeply engage students as active learners and critical thinkers who can apply their knowledge.

Throughout the next several months, the AC-T faculty will work to incorporate the Iowa Core Curriculum into its academic programs. Professional development will focus on the delivery of instruction, aligned with the goals of the Iowa Core Curriculum.

As you are reading this newsletter, hopefully the harsh winter weather will be behind us and spring will be here to stay! The extreme conditions this year resulted in 9 days of school being cancelled due to the weather, as well as numerous late starts and early dismissals. The AC-T School Board has amended the 2009-2010 school calendar to make up the missed days, making provisions to hold school on several days that had been scheduled as days school would not have been in session. School will be in session at AC-T on April 1, 5, and 6, and May 27 and 28. In addition, AC-T will have an extended school day, from 8:00 AM to 3:38 PM, during the weeks of April 19 through April 30, to make up time equivalent to one school day. Sioux Central School will be in session on April 2, but they will not have an extended school day during the last two weeks of April. A letter was sent home to all AC-T parents on March 19 with details regarding these schedule changes, as well as any resulting busing changes. If you have any questions regarding the calendar revisions or the extended school day, please do not hesitate to call the school office.

School districts across Iowa received news last October that school funding appropriated by the legislature for the 2009-2010 school year would be cut by 10 per cent. This has many districts around the state working to determine how they will compensate for this loss of funding. Your AC-T School Board is working hard to make sure AC-T programs and operations are running as efficiently as possible, while maintaining the tradition of educational excellence at AC-T.

Thank you for your continued support for AC-T, the faculty, students, and staff members. The support you provide is truly appreciated and valued as we continue our commitment to make AC-T a "Great Place to Start!"
