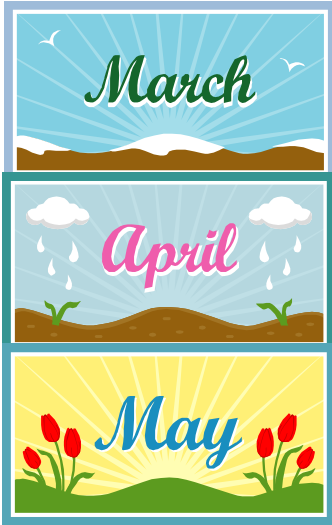

Nurse Notes

It is exciting to think that Spring may actually be here! There are many things we do in the Nurses' Office during this time of year. One of the BIG things is always the Pre-K and Kindergarten Round Ups. We are excited to see who our newest students will be in Preschool next fall and to see many of the current Preschoolers grow and learn as they prepare to move into Kindergarten in the fall. The parent night for Pre-K and K is April 4 at 6:30 pm. PLEASE bring along a copy of your child's current immunizations so that we can go over them and see what needs to be updated before Fall! If you know your child needs updates to begin Kindergarten, please be sure your child has had his/her 4th birthday and then schedule a time for immunizations BEFORE the week or two before school starts. That way if your child experiences any pain at the injection site or mild fever, it won't make that stressful time before school starts even more stressful for your child.

We have been busy with many runny noses, fevers and stomach aches. We just want to remind you that if we send your child home with a fever or throwing up, they need to be fever free or have not thrown up for AT LEAST 24 hours. That isn't just to protect your child but all the people your child comes in contact with, including adults. Doing this really does help us to keep everyone at AC-T healthy and ready to learn.

Just a reminder: The recommendations for prevention of head lice include parents checking the head of each child in the home for 15 minutes every week. Look carefully for nits (eggs) or lice. As lice can occur in any setting, we want to encourage you to take the time to do this every week.

Elementary Guidance News, by Mrs. Wildeman

Upper elementary students participated in a drug prevention unit called The Danger Zone (Human Relations Media, Inc.) in January and February 2011. Lessons within the unit focused on: the effects of alcohol, tobacco, and marijuana on your body and on your life, inhalants, prescription drugs, over-the-counter drugs, assertive ways to say “no”, and setting positive goals. A pretest and posttest was given to measure the program’s effectiveness. The results of the tests indicated a 38.6% increase in knowledge about drug prevention.

Parents are encouraged to have conversations with their children about drug and alcohol use. Helpful resources for parents to get started with these important conversations are from the Partnership for a Drug-Free Iowa and the Iowa Substance Abuse Information Center (ISAIC). Its associated websites include: www.drugfreeinfo.org (with a toll-free in Iowa 24/7 Help Line 1-866-242-4111) and www.FaceItTogether.com (check out the programs called “Take Five” and “The Power of Grandparents”).

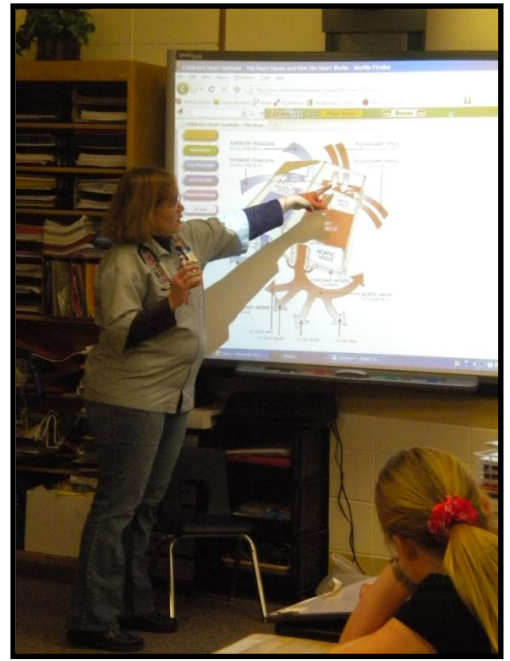
Ethanol Plant Visits AC-T

2nd Grade Happenings by Mrs. Annette Bruns

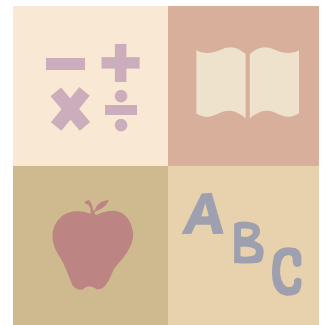

News from the Administration- by Barb Kady

With spring upon us, it is the time of year your local school board conducts part of the planning process for the next school year. A key part of this process is planning the budget. The economy in Iowa is showing a slight amount of growth, which is great news for all of us! The challenge your school board members face is the unknown amount of aid that will be allocated by the 2011 legislature, for school funding. Local school budget decisions must be completed by mid-March in order to meet publishing deadlines. With an undetermined amount of allowable growth in state education funding, school boards must plan for multiple scenarios. Your local school board, along with many Iowa school boards, have provided a great example of local reasonableness in light of the approximately \$500 million in two years of state underfunding due to across-the-board budget cuts and the underfunding of allowable growth in the fiscal year 2010 budget. Local Iowa districts taxed-back through the cash reserve levy less than 20% of the shortfall for FY 2011. Your school board members are managing your school's budget in a multi-year approach to restoring cash reserves following the sizable cuts in state funding in recent years.

Issues such as declining enrollment numbers also present funding challenges for AC-T, as is the case for many Iowa schools. If enrollment numbers go down more than allowable growth goes up, the district sees a decline in state funding. Your local district has been thoughtful regarding its use of funding, and has made reductions to the budget, working as much as possible to make reductions, yet maintain the integrity of the programs and services for students. It will continue to be critical for the district to keep expenditures in line with revenues to protect and preserve the unspent balance, or authorized budget, of the district.



Recent news reports have predicted a significant growth in enrollment for the Albert City-Truesdale School. The information, released by the Iowa Department of Education, was the result of a study done by the University of Iowa. The number of live births in a county were weighed against the population of each town in the county (according to the 2000 census), the percentage of students in the county that attend each school, and the rate of decline or growth each district in the county has experienced. The accuracy of these projections remains to be seen, particularly since the census data is from the year 2000. This would be a terrific turn around in our current enrollment trend, and your school board and school administration will be watching closely for any indications of the accuracy of this projection, as budgetary decisions for future years are made.

For the purposes of budget planning, your school board must look at the most current information available to them. The goal is always to prioritize needs in order to maintain a strong school and to provide the best possible learning activities for our students. Utilizing our resources to the fullest extent possible, while remaining fiscally responsible to the patrons of the district, is of utmost importance to your local school board. Thoughtful and proactive discussions are on-going regarding ways to offset the fiscal impact during these challenging economic times. Board members, administration, faculty, and staff members are working hard to ensure that AC-T students continue to receive an education that is unsurpassed anywhere.

April 10-16 is National Volunteer Appreciation Week. We would like to thank the many volunteers who donate their time and talents at AC-T. From parent volunteers to community members, to business and industry employees, we appreciate all you do for the students and staff at AC-T. Thank You!

Evidence of this top-notch education is seen daily at AC-T! During a recent school celebration, 19 students in grades K-6 received an award from the BV County Environmental poster contest. AC-T students received 5 of the 7 first place awards in the county, chosen from over 1,000 posters that were entered in the contest! A visit to the kindergarten room is a testament to the great start AC-T students receive in their school. You will find these young students reading books and reciting poetry! As you walk through the halls you will see certificates of awards displayed that have been earned by students for making progress in their silent reading comprehension skills. Visit the AC-T library on Wednesday afternoon and you will see our first grade readers sharing their love for reading with community volunteers. You will see technology being integrated into instruction through the use of smart boards, iPads, laptop computers, and document cameras. A look at the 2011 Iowa Test of Basic Skills results will show you that AC-T's 4th grade class is 100 percent proficient in math AND reading, AND science! The Pride of AC-T parent group actively supports and encourages students and teachers through efforts such as providing nutritious snacks during testing week. The AC-T music boosters have helped to purchase new instruments and a digital piano for the music department. In addition, all students have shown a commitment to service by collecting items to send to local and area servicemen on active duty. AC-T students, faculty, and staff have been part of a project to send more than 150 boxes of items to our area servicemen over the past school year.



The spring months bring even more opportunities to witness the accomplishments of our young students, and the results of the hard work of the dedicated faculty and staff at AC-T. We invite you to join us for the third and fourth grade plays on April 28, the spring musical on May 10, the Little Hurricane Relays on May 16, and sixth grade graduation on May 26.

And always, we thank each of you, for your continued support in making AC-T a truly “Great Place to Start” for all of our students!
