# Honor Choir



# **Author and Herpetologist Visits Albert City-Truesdale Elementary**

Did you know that snakes smell with their tongues or that turtles do not have teeth? David Nieves, author and herpetologist, explained these facts and much more during his visit to Albert City-Truesdale Elementary on Wednesday, April 20<sup>th</sup>.

In celebration of National Library Month, Mr. Nieves shared with us his knowledge of writing, authoring books, how books and reading has affected his life in a positive way and his passionate career of studying reptiles and amphibians as a herpetologist.

"When I was 8 years old, I decided reptiles and amphibians were my favorite things in the whole wide world," Nieves said. He became a member of a junior naturalist program at the local nature center and by the time he was in middle school he was sharing his love and knowledge of reptiles with elementary-school students in his hometown of Bellevue, Nebraska.

Nieves, a graduate of Iowa State University, has dedicated and devoted himself to the field of herpetology and hence founded and created Reptile Education and Research in 1990, a facility dedicated to the study of reptiles and amphibians from around the world. His career as a research herpetologist takes him to many amazing places to study and photograph these incredible creatures. David's photographs are in his two children's books: *Reptiles Up Close* and *More Reptiles Up Close*.

During Nieves's multimedia program, presenting to AC-T preschool through sixth grade students and staff, we learned how we are different from reptiles, what we share with them, and why we need them around. During the program Mr. Nieves introduced us to six live reptiles that he owns and habitats in his own laboratory. Among the group of creatures he brought with him was an alligator snapping turtle, a white rat snake, a vine snake, a green anaconda snake, a cape monitor lizard and the biggest and most surprising attraction, a 23 year old Albino Python snake named Maggie. Maggie is a powerful and beautiful banana colored 16 foot long snake weighing 155 pounds.

Because of a strong commitment to educate others about this misunderstood and feared group of animals, David continues to present educational programs to people of all ages at schools, libraries, nature centers, literature festivals, children's museums, expos, and zoos. His books have become an additional way to share and David has recently published this third book, *Amphibians Up Close*.

"Author visits are the ultimate literacy experience," states Paulette McCall, Teacher Librarian. "Connecting students with real-live authors generates interest in books and reading, an excitement for writing, and it models career choices in the imaginative arts."

The author program was sponsored by our local PACT group.

After lunch, the children were able to visit the small zoo there and walk the trail as they saw deer, swans, turtles, goats, and geese. Summer is here! As another school year wraps up, we want to thank you for the time we get to spend with your child, watching them grow and learn all year, and take the opportunity to remind you of a few things...

Head Lice: We like to remind parents at every opportunity to continue to check the head of every child in your home

weekly, for at least 15 minutes, looking for nits (eggs) and adult lice. They like to stay close to the scalp, and the nits are attached firmly; they do not come out without being pulled off. If discovered, you can check with your child's doctor for treatment. Usually an over-the-counter shampoo is sufficient, used according to the directions, and repeated in 10 days. You must also wash all bedding and articles that came into contact with that child's head in very hot water, as well as vacuum all surfaces and

furniture where they may have been. Please teach your child never to share hats, combs, pillows, hair articles or other items that come into contact with the head!

Immunizations: Please check with your healthcare provider and ensure that your child's immunizations are up to date. It is far easier to do this right away in June, rather than waiting until school starts or adding that to the list of things to be done in August!

Dental and Vision Checks: Kindergarteners are required by Iowa law to have a dental screen done within the last two years before starting kindergarten. Please contact the school office if you need a form (ours are orange); or, you may obtain one from your dentist's office. This is required for all K students; but it's a great idea for all children to get their teeth and eyes checked during the summer!

Medications: All students who need to take meds at school MUST have a form giving directions and permission, signed by a parent, before we can give those at school. This applies to meds taken all year, or those your child only needs to take for a few days. Students are NOT allowed to carry meds to and from school; they must be in an original container, and parents must drop them off and pick them up. Pharmacies are willing to give you a separate container for school; ask for one when you fill a prescription. Food Allergies and Intolerances: At registration, you will need to fill out a yellow form, signed by your doctor, for any true food allergy your child has. (Forms can also be obtained in the school office and faxed by your doctor to 843-2195.) Please understand that there is a difference between true allergies and food intolerances.

Be sure to practice summer safety with all of your activities, especially near water and in the sun. Use sunscreen (apply sunscreen first if also using insect repellant) and make sure all family members drink plenty of water! The next school year will be starting before we know it; have a fun and healthy summer!

The faculty, staff, and administration at AC-T would again like to say thank you to each of you for your support. You can feel proud of your students and your school when looking at the accomplishments over the course of the school year. At the end of the year awards ceremony, 36 awards were given to students who excelled on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills this year....out of a total of 59 students who took the test! You will be reading about more student accomplishments throughout this newsletter.

Our faculty is continuing to work on the implementation plan of the Common Core/Iowa Core Curriculum. This curriculum:

- Is about the success of all students:
- Communicates the expectation that all students learn at high levels;
- Honors prior work the district has done to develop curriculum;
- Focuses on 21<sup>st</sup> century skills;
- Includes state content standards:
- Encourages instructional practices that deeply engage students as active learners and critical thinkers who can apply their knowledge.

As part of the implementation plan, the AC-T faculty is engaged in a study of the Characteristics of Effective Instruction, focusing on differentiating instruction to meet the needs of all learners. To help students develop 21<sup>st</sup> century skills, students and teachers are incorporating the use of technology in many ways. iPads have been used by students and staff to provide individualized activities aligned with student needs. Smartboard technology is used to engage the learner through a variety of different activities. Laptops provide a nearly one to one ratio of computers to students at AC-T. In addition, ACT has partnered with the Sioux Central School to implement a one to one computer initiative for students in grades 7 through 12.

Included in this newsletter you will find the calendar for the upcoming school year. Attendance is so very important to a successful school year. Looking forward to next year, we would encourage parents to schedule appointments or out of town trips during times or days that school is not in session in order to minimize the amount of time students are absent from the classroom.
