Elementary Guidance and Counseling News by Wendy Wildeman, School Counselor



Hello families! I have two items to mention in our newsletter this month. One is a brief reminder of individual counseling offered to all students PK-6th grades. The second item is about our research-based Guidance curriculum called Second Step which I am very excited to be

Individual Counseling

Albert City-Truesdale focuses on the academic, career, and social/emotional development for every student. I am available to provide individual counseling upon request for any PK-6th grade student. I have worked with many students for a wide variety of reasons, and value confidentiality and respect for the student and family. The body of the permission form states: "Individual counseling has been requested for . If you are interested, it will most likely be 15-20 minutes, once a week, for about six weeks. I will work out a schedule with the classroom teacher that will minimally interfere with learning. During our individual sessions, we will discuss _____. All sessions will be kept confidential unless there is a threat of harm to self, others, or in the case of a subpoena. Parent/Guardian permission is required to begin individual counseling, and it can be withdrawn at any time. If you would like me to meet with _____, please sign and date below and return to me. I also have a list of area resources for additional support, if needed, please ask. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me."

Second Step

The Second Step program is for PK through Grade 5 (and grade 6 this first year) is a universal, classroombased program to increase students' school success and decrease problem behaviors by promoting socialemotional competence and self-regulation. It teaches skills that strengthen students' ability to learn, have empathy, manage emotions, and solve problems. It creates a safer, more respectful learning environment that promotes school success for all. The Second Step program increases kids' skills for learning-such as paying attention, listening, and sitting still-as well as how to manage their emotions, solve problems, and make friends. All these skills help kids do better in school and in life. The goal of the Second Step program is to promote social-emotional competence and selfregulation skills. Our units include: Skills for Learning, Empathy, Emotion Management, and Problem Solving. Each week the classroom teachers are given a coordinating handout to practice and implement our Second Step skills in school. Some weeks your student has brought home Home Link papers for you to practice with them as an influential adult in your child's life.


I have included information from the CDC about how portion sizes have changed over the years. What changes can you make in your
